EDUCATION & OUTREACH



On the third Saturday in March, Bell Buckle celebrates Daffodil Day. On that day, the Bee City Committee hosts a plant exchange and provides free milkweed seed packets to the public as well as information on eliminating the use of pesticides and using companion planting to discourage harmful pests in the garden. Bell Buckle also provides a class in beginning beekeeping on Daffodil Day. Bell Buckle Bee City committee worked with students at Webb School to choose and plant native species trees in Bell Buckle Park. We also worked with Webb students to plant daffodils along Webb Road.
